
Health and Safety

About the show

Young students will be delighted by the playfulness of colorful puppets in Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia's *It's Okay to Be Different*. This stage adaptation features three contemporary stories by New York Times bestselling author and illustrator Todd Parr ("It's Okay to Be Different," "The Earth Book" and "This is My Hair") and delivers important messages about selfconfidence, caring for the earth, and acceptance, no matter what your hair looks like.

Objective: Students will create a craft mirror to recognize what is special about themselves in theme with Todd Parr's book "It's Okay to be Different."

Lesson One

Materials:

- Lesson borrowed from the Gaillard Center: <u>https://gaillardcenter.org/wp-content/uploads/lts-Ok-</u> <u>to-Be-Different-Lesson-Plan-1.pdf</u>
- Construction paper
- Aluminum foil
- Glue sticks and tape
- Popsicle sticks
- Decorations: jewels, stickers, feathers, sequins, etc.
- "It's Okay to be Different" by Todd Parr

Activity:

- Read "It's Okay to be Different" by Todd Parr.
 - Ask the students what is something special about them.
 - Examples: They're a great friend, they are funny, they can do a cartwheel, etc.
- Explain to the students they're going to create "mirrors."
- Have the students trace the template for the mirror onto a piece of construction paper and cut it out. If it is
 more appropriate for your students, hand out the pre-cut pieces of the mirror.
- Hand out pieces of aluminum foil; have students glue the aluminum foil to the construction paper, creating a mirror.
- Have them write "I am Special" on the bottom of their mirror.
- Distribute the decorations and have the students share them and decorate their mirrors.
- Once their mirrors are decorated, glue or tape the popsicle stick to the back of the mirror.

Did You Know?

Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia has a unique show ahead of you! Utilizing puppets and black-light, the characters of Todd Parr's books come to life on stage. According to Jim Morrow, Managing Artistic Director of Mermaid Theatre of Nova Scotia, "The lighting is ultraviolet, and the paint is fluorescent. This is typically called 'black-light theater'. When the ultraviolet light hits the fluorescent paint, it glows. What's interesting is that the ultraviolet light is actually blue light even though they call it black light. So, if you project UV light on white, it will show up light blue."

Lesson Two

Objective: Students will show off their love of nature through an alternative painting method.

Materials:

- White pieces of construction paper
- Various colors of paints
- Paper plates to put the paints on
- Corks or another object that can be used as a round stamp
- "The Earth Book" by Todd Parr

Activity:

- Prepare: Put dollops of paint in various colors on paper plates for the students to put their corks into to paint. Chose nature colors like green, blue, brown, yellow, etc.
- Ask your students, what is their favorite season? Why do they like that season? Is it the colorful leaves in fall? The pretty snow during winter?
- Read "The Earth Book" by Todd Parr
 - What are some ways we can take care of the Earth? Examples: Recycle, ride our bikes, use reusable bags, etc.
- Explain to the students they get to paint their favorite part of nature, whether that be a flower, tree, an animal or even the planet Earth! Instead of brushes, they will be stamping paint with corks, making a pointillism (art using dots) painting.
- Make sure the artists sign their work when they finish!
- Have your students share their paintings with each other by having them walk around the classroom as if they are at an art gallery.

Todd Parr is an author and illustrator of more than sixty children's books. Fun fact, a lot of his early books didn't have correct punctuation. This is because he started out as an artist, painting on large canvases and writing messages on the top. He has since realized he needs to set an example and makes sure everything is spelled right in his new books and proper grammar is used in his new books!
