Welcome to the Fox Cities Performing Arts Center!

When entering the Fox Cities Performing Arts Center, remember to **show respect for others and your environment** so everyone can fully enjoy and participate in the experience.

- During the performance, the performers can see and hear you, so give them your full attention.
 Unlike a video, we can not rewind and replay a scene if we miss it.

- Important things to remember:
 - Student backpacks, gum, drinks and food are not allowed in the theater.
 - Cell phones should be turned off and stowed.
 - Note that recording or taking photos in the theater is strictly prohibited; however, photos may be taken in the lobby.
 - It's a long way down please do not drop items off balconies.

Be prepared to arrive early

 You should plan on arriving to the Center 20 minutes before the show. Allow for travel time, parking and trips to the restroom.



Health and Safety

- The Center has created a touchless experience with the Evolv Express Security System. Upon entry, all bags entering the building are subject to search and prohibited items will not be allowed.
- Teachers and chaperones are discouraged from bringing bags, however, necessary backpacks or bags may be searched and tagged before being allowed in the theater.
- We ask that students leave their backpacks at school for Amcor Education Series performances. However, if students do bring them, they are subject to search and will need to be checked at the registration table in the lobby upon entry.

Lesson One

Objective: Students will use their imaginations to put art to a poem by Lewis Carroll.

Materials:

- "Jabberwocky" by Lewis Carroll: https://www.poetryfoundation.org/poems/42916/jabberwocky
- White pieces of paper
- Coloring utensils

Activity:

- "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland" is a whimsical story that incorporates a lot of language created by Lewis Carroll himself. A great example of this comes from his poem "Jabberwocky."
- Guiding Question: How can we use context clues to figure out what Lewis Carroll means in his poem "Jabberwocky?"
- In pairs, assign each pair a stanza from the poem (there are seven) and ask them they need to illustrate what is happening in that stanza. It can just be one picture setting the scene, but they need to use context clues to figure out what is happening.
- Give the students time to close-read their stanza and illustrate the scene.
- When it's all done, hang their explanations up along with their stanzas, so the class can get an idea of what is happening in the poem! It will be fun to see all of their interpretations!

Pid You Know?

"Mad as a hatter" did not originate from "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland." Instead, the phrase is linked to the hat-making industry. Unfortunately, many hatters during the 18th and 19th centuries used mercury nitrate to make hats. The chemical was used to turn the fur of small animals into felt for hats. For these poor craftsmen, prolonged exposure had them develop physical and mental ailments such as tremors, speech problems, emotional instability and hallucinations.

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Lesson Two

Objective: Students will conduct research into a character from "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland" and write a limerick about the character.

Materials:

- Computer access
- · Writing utensils
- Paper

Activity:

- Review what a limerick poem is if your students are unfamiliar. This site has a good explanation of the structure of the poem (aabba): https://poets.org/glossary/limerick
 - Limerick Example:

There was an Old Man with a beard, Who said, "It is just as I feared! Two Owls and a Hen, Four Larks and a Wren, Have all built their nests in my beard!"

- Edward Lear
- The purpose of a limerick is usually full of a little nonsense and a good deal of fun, just like Lewis Carroll's writing.
- Choosing a character from "Alice's Adventures in Wonderland," write a limerick about the character using part of its storyline or getting creative about its plot of characters.
 - Examples of characters include Alice, Hatter, Queen of Hearts, White Rabbit, Caterpillar, Cheshire Cat and more!
